The Christmas Concert was a great success. We had a very good crowd in attendance, despite the cold temperatures.

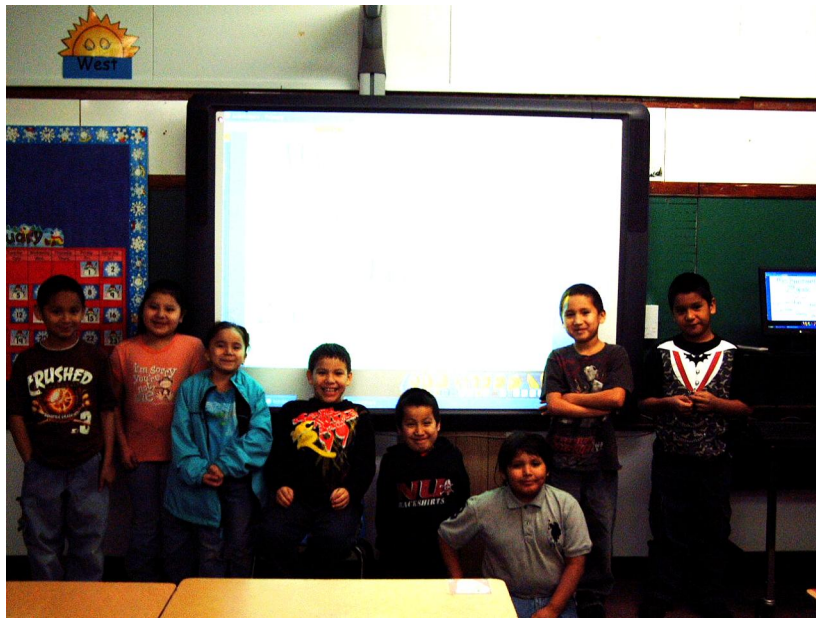
Santa Claus even made an appearance.

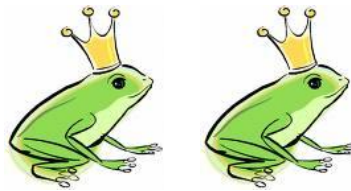
5th Graders Dream BIG

Mrs. Wood's fifth grade class kicked off their "Dream Big" theme by talking to actor, director, and musician Richard Myles (Blackfoot) and director Mischa Perez (Mayan Descent) using the classroom interactive white board and Skype. The two men talked about how they "dreamed big" and got their foot in the door of the movie industry. They stressed the importance of believing in yourself and supporting others around you. They talked to each student asking about their dreams and hopes for the future. They encouraged everyone to go for their dreams and never give up. Students will be talking to several people over the course of the semester. Kia Russell commented, "It was cool to meet Richard and I was really excited to meet both of them. They told us to follow our dreams and that was a good thing. My favorite part was when I got to talk to them."

5th and 6th Graders Establish Advisory Groups

The 5th and 6th grade students established their advisory groups the second week in January. Advisory groups consist of students that work well together, have different strengths and weaknesses, and want to help the others in their group achieve. All classes discussed their strengths and the pros and cons of certain individuals joining the same groups. In the end, each class divided into four groups. These groups will work together for the remainder of the year. They will help, encourage, and teach each other along the way. Jaeclyn Olson commented, "It is fun to do. It is good to see what everyone else is curious about and you can hear things from other people that you haven't thought of. I think the groups are a good idea because the people can make more decisions on what they want to do and to learn how to help people if they are stuck on something." Group members help each other keep track of assignments due, late work, and keep track of work for individuals that miss classes. Each week the groups write questions or concerns in their group notebook and one member of each group meets with the facilitator (Mrs. Wood) to go over them. The facilitator also uses this time to inform students of special assignments or events that are coming up. The representatives then leave Advisory Council and report back to the rest of their group on what was discussed during the meeting. Mrs. Wood reported, "Advisory groups are a great way to help students become more self-reliant and become more involved in their educational process. This is the second year I have established groups and the students seem to enjoy being involved in classroom decisions and helping one another."

In Mr. Redden's room, we have had an exciting time so far in the New Year. He was recently one of the teacher's to receive a Promethean board for his room. Having this board has already improved student interaction and created a better learning environment. The students are very excited and seem to be more interested and engaged in learning. As of right now the 7th graders are learning about Acids, Bases, and Solutions. The 8th graders are learning about Bacteria, Viruses and will be dissecting frogs sometime in April. Overall, the students are doing a good job and with the New Year comes a new start.



What's happening in Mrs. Nelsen's Room

It has been a busy year in Mrs. Nelsen's class. The students are very excited to begin working on the Promethean board. This is an interactive board that is connected using a computer. The students have been working hard on writing, reading, math and social skills. Students are completing reading checkouts every week to monitor their reading progress. In math, students are taking daily timed tests to see if they can learn their basic math facts "swing of things". With everyone's help we can make this semester a good and productive one.

The Wathill staff is in the process of switching over from our NAHPLC model to Advanced Ed., which is Advancing Excellence in Education Worldwide. Walthill Public School is going for the National Accreditation, where the school will be compared to other schools nationwide.

The school will have a readiness visit this March to inform the staff our strengths and weaknesses. This data will then help the school get ready for the external team visit March 2011. The overall purpose of an external team visit is to add an outside, objective view of the progress of the work accomplished by the school. There is a degree of validation of the work of local committees, but the primary purpose is to enlist the professional advice and collaboration of colleagues from outside the district.

The District school wide goal is that all K-12 students will improve their math scores across the curriculum, and the staff will use the data collected to see where improvements are needed.

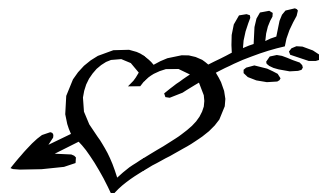

Frostbite

Exposure to below-freezing temperatures can cause frostbite, a rare but serious condition that requires emergency care. Frostbite can affect any area of the skin and in extreme cold can develop within minutes.



Signs and Symptoms

- aching pain or numbness, most often on hands, feet, face, and ears
- skin that feels hard and waxy, with a white or grayish yellow color



What to Do:

If you think a child is frostbitten **call the doctor right away**. Begin these steps:

- Bring the child indoors immediately. **Do not try to thaw frostbite unless you're in a warm place** (warming and then re-exposing frozen parts to cold can cause permanent damage).
- Remove wet clothing.
- **Do not rub frostbitten parts** – treat them gently.
- **Do not use dry heat** – such as a fireplace, oven, or heating pad-to thaw frostbite.
- **Do not break any blisters.**
- Warm the frostbitten parts in **warm (not hot) water** for about 30 minutes.
- Place clean cotton balls between frostbitten fingers and toes after they've been warmed.
- Loosely wrap warmed areas with clean bandages to prevent refreezing.
- Give the child acetaminophen or ibuprofen for pain.

Seek Emergency Medical Care if the Child Has:

- a body part or area of skin that is turning white and hard



Think Prevention!

Stay updated on weather forecasts. Keep kids warm and dry in cold weather. Loose-fitting, layered warm clothes are best. Have kids wear well-insulated boots, thick socks, hats, scarves, and mittens. Icepacks applied directly to the skin can cause frostbite – always cover icepacks with a cloth before applying to the skin.
